INTRODUCTION

Purpose:

to get a comprehensive perspective on the effectiveness and value of District and site level programs and resources related to key school climate topics

KEY FINDINGS: TEACHING AND LEARNING

Stakeholders generally rated academic quality and support at BUSD schools positively

73% of students (up 5% from last year)
78% of parents (up 4 % from last year)
82% of staff (up 3% from last year)
agreed that their child's school challenged students academically

63% of students (same as last year)
69% of parents (up 3% from last year)
79% of staff (up 2% from last year)
agreed that their child's school offered academic support when students needed more help

KEY FINDINGS: TEACHING AND LEARNING

47% of students (up 1% from last year)
73% of parents (up 1% from last year)
agreed that their child's teacher(s) connected course
content to life outside of class

***88%** of parents with students in A.P. and Honors classes agreed that their students were adequately challenged academically

88% of parents of English learner students **(up 9 % from last year)** agreed that their students were offered adequate academic support

67% of parents of GATE students **(up 3% from last year)** agreed that their students were adequately challenged academically

69% of parents of Special Education students **(up 8% from last year)** agreed that their students were offered adequate academic support

KEY FINDINGS: TEACHING AND LEARNING

Student and staff perceptions about technology resources are improving

72% of students (up 5% from last year)
66% of staff (up 8% from last year)
76% of parents (up 2% from last year)
agreed or strongly agreed that their school offered
adequate technology resources for students

District schools provided students with safe, positive, and supportive environments

72% of students (up 5% from last year)
84% of parents (up 1% from last year)
91% of staff (no change from last year)
felt that students were safe at school

62% of students (down 2% from last year)
83% of parents (up 1% from last year)
89% of staff (up 1% from last year)
felt that their school provided a positive
learning environment for students

More effective communication is needed regarding emergency procedures

74% of students (up 5% from last year)
65% of parents (down 3% from last year)
83% of staff (down 4% from last year)
agreed that their school provided clear information
about emergency procedures in the event of a crisis
or disaster

BULLYING:

DEFINED IN THIS YEAR'S SURVEY

Full definition taken directly from BUSD Board Policy 5131.2

• (1) Bullying is a form of violence.

The acts involve real or perceived imbalance of power with the more powerful student, person, or group attacking those who are less powerful.

- (2) Bullying involves subjecting a person to abusive actions.
 Typically, bullying behavior is unprovoked, intentional, and repeated over time, and includes the use of hurtful words and/or acts.
- (3) Bullying may include, but is not limited to.....

gestures or written, verbal, or physical acts that are reasonably perceived as being motivated by general disrespect or by any actual or perceived characteristics, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, a mental, physical, or sensory disability, or on the basis of association with an individual who falls into one of the protected categories, that takes place on school property, on any school sponsored function, or on a school bus, or that (1) places student or school employee in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person or well-being; or damage to his or her property or (2) has the effect of substantially interfering with the student's educational performance, opportunities, or benefits; or (3) has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of the school.

Harassment and bullying among students still remains significant issue on District campuses

64% of students (up 3% from last year)
52% of parents (down 4% from last year)
61% of staff (up 3% from last year)
reported that students experienced bullying at school this year

36% of students (up 2% from last year)
45% of parents (down 2% from last year)
claimed that they / their child never experienced some form of
verbal harassment from other students this year

Students still felt most comfortable reporting incidents of bullying to friends (28%), up 2% points from last year; or parents (23%), same as last year

15% of students **(up 5% from last year)** *felt most comfortable reporting incidents of bullying to teachers*

51% of students **(down 1% from last year)** *indicated that fear of being identified would prevent them from reporting bullying*

36% of students (down 1% from last year)
59% of parents (up 1% from last year)
agreed that their child's school rules against bullying and verbal abuse were effective

Staff members need more support when it comes to dealing with the problem of bullying at school

> **56%** of staff members **(up 3% from last year)** agreed that their school had a proactive anti-bullying campaign or program

47% of staff members (same as last year) agreed that the adults who work at their school received effective anti-bullying training

35% of staff **(down 1% from last year)** *indicated that staff members at their school experienced bullying this year*

KEY FINDINGS: MENTAL HEALTH

More students, parents, and staff felt their school provided support and resources to address social/emotional and mental health concerns

65% of students (up 9% from last year)
63% of parents (up 8% from last year)
78% of staff (up 9% from last year)
agreed that their school provided resources for students having
social / emotional problems or mental health needs

37% of students **(up 6% from last year)** reported being likely to talk with someone about their issues related to mental health (e.g., stress, anxiety, depression)

KEY FINDINGS: FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Parents reported feeling satisfied with communication from school

78% of parents (same as last year) agreed that their child's principal communicated regularly with parents

79% of parents **(up 3% from last year)** agreed that their child's principal and office staff made them feel welcome and wanted at school

79% of parents **(up 3% from last year)** agreed that their child's principal and office staff responded professionally and proactively to their questions and concerns

KEY FINDINGS: STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

Students' perceptions of connectedness to school remained similar to the previous year

60% of students **(up 3% from previous year)** agreed that there was an adult at school they could talk to if they had problems

51% of students **(same as last year)** agreed that their teachers communicated with them about their progress at school

46% of students (down 2% from last year) indicated that they enjoyed going to school

KEY FINDINGS: COLLEGE / CAREER READINESS

There was notable improvement in parent and staff perceptions of students' post-secondary preparation

> **73%** of parents **(up 9% from last year)** *felt their child had a plan for college upon graduation*

66% of staff **(up 19% from last year)** *felt their students had a plan for college upon graduation*

67% of parents **(up 12% from last year)** *felt their child had a plan for career upon graduation*

58% of staff **(up 16% from last year)** *felt their students had a plan for career upon graduation*

KEY FINDINGS: PRACTICAL ARTS / CTE

Stakeholders viewed the Practical Arts / CTE program more positively in 2017

72% of parents **(up 13% from last year)** agreed that the CTE program provided a sufficient variety of course offerings

73% of parents **(up 17% from last year)** agreed that the CTE program provided strong preparation for a career in a relevant field

74% of parents **(up 18% from last year)** agreed or strongly agreed that the CTE program provided strong preparation for their child's post-secondary education

54% of students **(up 26% from last year)** *felt that their CTE/Practical Arts courses were challenging*

KEY FINDINGS: SCHOOL DISTRICT PERSONNEL

Staff members rated district office administrators more favorably in 2017 than in 2016

55% of staff (up 9% from last year)

reported that central office administrators incorporated input from a wide variety of stakeholders

53% of staff **(up 7% from last year)** reported that central office administrators communicated a strong vision for the District

86% of staff (up 32% from last year)

reported that their direct supervisor encouraged a culture of respect

76% of staff (up 27% from last year)

reported that their direct supervisor set clear expectations for meeting department goals

KEY FINDINGS: SCHOOL DISTRICT PERSONNEL

School level staff were generally satisfied with their principals' leadership

78% of staff **(up 1% from last year)** agreed that their principal encouraged a culture of respect

77% of staff **(up 1% from last year)** agreed that their principal collaborated with school staff to improve learning outcomes

77% of staff **(up 2% from last year)** agreed that their principal incorporated input from a wide range of school stakeholders

76% of staff **(up 4% from last year)** agreed that their principal encouraged a culture of open communication

KEY FINDINGS: DISTRICT INITIATIVES

There was still overall low parent familiarity with the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and Bond Measure S

20% of parents (same as last year) reported awareness of the LCAP

60% of staff (up 3% from last year) reported awareness of the LCAP

30% of parents **(up 6% from last year)** reported awareness of Bond Measure S

52% of staff **(up 4% from last year)** reported awareness of Bond Measure S

AREAS NOTED FOR IMPROVEMENT

Enhance anti-bullying education at schools; increase staff training on how to address bullying

38% of students **(up 1% from last year)** agreed or strongly agreed that school rules were applied fairly

47% of students **(up 3% from last year)** *felt that campus supervisors fairly enforced school rules and regulations*

36% of students **(down 1% from last year)** *felt that school rules against bullying and verbal abuse were effective*

35% of students **(down 3% from last year)** *felt their schools had proactive anti-bullying campaigns*

47% of staff **(same as last year)** *felt they received effective professional development that addressed bullying* 20

AREAS NOTED FOR IMPROVEMENT

Focus on communicating a clearer vision about our major district initiatives - to parents and the community

> Majority of parents and community members are not familiar with the LCAP or Bond Measure S, and do not feel informed about the details of these initiatives

NEXT STEPS (2017-2018)

- Carefully review and study these results and begin to strategically look at (and develop plans for) areas that need improvement
- Engage Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) Stakeholder in a review of all programs and services that impact school climate
- Use the LCAP as a venue to make changes or support existing effective programs
 - new time / location for meetings
- Plan to have students and staff surveyed in early spring, and parents and community members surveyed at registration time
 - for increased student and parent participation
